HomeAid Houston, a project of the Greater Houston Builders Association, has agreed to partner with Children at Heart Ministries to build a second home for its Gracewood residential ministry to single mothers and their children in Houston. BROWNSVILLE—Contrary to an Internet blogger's assertions, all documents pertaining to a probe into misappropriated Texas Baptist church-starting funds in the Rio Grande Valley have been turned over to federal authorities, a high-ranking official in the U.S. Attorney's Office in Houston said.

Tim Johnson, first assistant in the U.S. Attorney's Office for the southern district of Texas, confirmed receipt of materials related to a Baptist General Convention of Texas-initiated investigation into allegations of fraud and misappropriation of church-starting funds.

When the old generation of Israelites died in the wilderness after wandering 40 years, Moses assembled their descendants, the new generation, east of the Jordan River and told them to "listen to the statutes and laws which I proclaim to you this day.
