DALLAS—A killer is stalking Hispanic teenagers, and it is beginning to claim a wider circle of victims, a group of Dallas-area youth ministers recently learned.

The killer drug—cheese heroin—has become a favorite of many Hispanic teens, because a single dose in a small plastic bag sells for only about \$2, said Javier Rios, a drug intervention/prevention and gang consultant with

the Dallas Independent School District and interim pastor of Iglesia Bautista Compañerismo Oikos.
