Around the State: Balloon release at Leander anniversary; UMHB honors African-American grad

Affixed to each balloon—which carried the message "He is risen"—was a card with the church's name and a Scripture verse, John 3:16. **Jarvis Philpot**, age 95, has been the church's pastor since its beginning. **Steve Melton**, former pastor of First Baptist Church in Leander, which was instrumental in starting Round Mountain Baptist, was a special guest at the celebration.

She taught English in Killeen, where she became the school district's first African-American guidance counselor. She retired from the Killeen Independent School District in 1994 after a quarter-century of service and opened the Adolescent and Family Counseling Center in Killeen, where she was president and chief executive officer.

Elysian Fields High School Principal Jack Parker and Elysian Fields Independent School District Superintendent Maynard Chapman sign an agreement to begin "Yellow Jacket University" in the fall semester. This new partnership will allow high school students at Elysian Fields to take college courses toward their high school diploma and earn up to 27 hours of college credit. Representatives of East Texas Baptist University and Elysian Fields Independent School District signed an agreement marking the formation of what they call "Yellow Jacket University." Starting in the fall semester, ETBU will offer dual-credit college courses to Elysian Fields High School students on the university campus, in Elysian Fields High School classrooms and online. The courses will be offered for \$100 per semester hour, and students will be allowed to take up to 27 semester hours before they graduate—about 25 percent of an undergraduate degree. The credit hours from ETBU will be transferable to any university in Texas.
