CBF missions coordinator resigns. Six years after leaving Shorter College to become top missions administrator for the [Cooperative Baptist Fellowship](#), Rob Nash is returning to the classroom at McAfee School of Theology. Nash, 52, has accepted a position as professor of missions and world religions and associate dean at the theology school located on Mercer University's branch campus in Atlanta. Jim Smith, director of field ministries for CBF, has been named interim coordinator of global missions beginning July 1.

Group urges diplomacy with Iran. Directors of the [Baptist Peace Fellowship of North America](#) adopted a statement urging "diplomacy over bombs" in the United States' relations with Iran. The group asked the president to commit to "waging peace" and called on the United States and its allies to use "ethical, humanitarian principles" in responding to the threat posed by the prospect of Iran developing nuclear weapons.

Kevin Ueckert, pastor of [South Side Baptist Church in Abilene](#), has been named as the sole Texas representative on the Southern Baptist Convention Committee on Resolutions.
