"The national news media is slow to recognize the contributions made by faith-based groups, fearing, I suppose, critics of religion. Ken Camp's direct, yet gentle, descriptions of how the Texas Baptists ministered to 'the least of these' helped the reader see needs of children from any country under any circumstances need to be met."

The *Baptist Standard* won three awards of merit—second place—including a "Best in Class" award for general excellence in the "online: independent website" category.
