## Texans call for an end to persecution in China

Upon Chinese Communist Party head Xi Jinping's visit to the United States, it is my hope Americans will focus on China's terrible human rights record as well as bringing the former leader Jiang Zemin to justice for launching the massive 16-year persecution campaign against Falun Gong.
